The books are written in natural language and provide ideal reading material for those who want to improve their English language and literacy skills and will also appeal to anyone interested in the moving stories of refugees and migrants. My Level 1 class recently read one of the books together and really enjoyed it. Most went on to read other titles in the series. The books would also be suitable for Entry 3 and Entry 2 with support.

Marion Molteno, herself an author, came to talk to a mixed Entry 2 – Level 1 group at our college about the work of the publishers and the titles in the series. Over sixty students attended what was a very enjoyable and engaging session. The students had lots of questions to ask about the books and the authors and were also able to purchase copies of the books.
